Centennial of the End of World War I

• Armistice went into effect: November 11, 1918 (11/11/11) 11:11 a.m.

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- Don't fail to ask the question.
- My own failures to capitalize on what I knew.
- World War I uniform found in the crawlspace.

World War I When Did It Begin

For the European Nations

August 1914

For the United States

• American Expeditionary Force (AEF): April 6, 1917 - November 11,

Possible Role Your Ancestor Might Have Filled

- Military member of U.S. Army, Marines, or Navy
- Merchant Marines who transported troops, supplies, aircraft, etc. to the European theater
- Red Cross Nurses
- Telephone switchboard operators

Civilian support staff in various capacities

These are by no means all of the possible work positions you may find your own ancestor was involved with. But, there were many different skills and jobs that were required to support the war effort.

Finding Your Kentucky World War I Ancestor

Major roadblocks - lack of personal identification information

- July 1973 fire at the National Archives (National Personnel Records Center) facility in St. Louis, Missouri
 - Who was affected:
 - Dates of records severely damaged or destroyed
 - Army veterans . . .
- Good News!! -- Navy and Marine Corps records were not affected

Howard Holtzclaw: My Maternal Grandfather

Date and place of birth: June 5, 1895/ Lincoln County, Kentucky

Date and place of death: April 20, 1959/Farm on Perkins Lane, outside Lancaster (Garrard County), Kentucky (actually died from a stroke in a field on his farm)

Registered for both the World War I draft and for World War II

U.S. Army Service Number: 1981263 Date of Enlistment: September 21, 1917

Wounded in battle: France, September 29, 1918 (less than a month and a half from the war's end)

Discharged: June 21, 1919

Unit: Company D, 120th Infantry, 30th Division, United States Army

Decorations: SS and PH (Silver Star and Purple Heart)

Highest Rank Achieved: Private First Class
