OF
BOURBON AND NICHOLAS COUNTIES

The Cray family came to Bourbon and Nicholas counties, Kentucky, from Maryland, probably Montgomery County. The family settled near Millersburg, which is on the line between Bourbon and Nicholas.

Family tradition says the name was originally McCray, but the name was changed because an early member of the family fled Scotland for political reasons and disguised his name to escape detection in America.

The family of Martin L. Cray and Mary (Robbins) Cray:

The 1850 Census of Nicholas County:

Martin L. Cray, age 65, farmer, born Maryland
Mary Cray, age 55, born Delaware
Martin A. Cray, age 28, born Kentucky
Harrison A. Cray, age 14, born Kentucky

The known children of Martin L. and Mary Cray were:

1. John R. Cray, born c. 1816, married his cousin, Mary Robbins, in Bourbon County Aug. 2, 1843. They were the parents of at least two children: (1) John M., and (2) Mary Emily, who married Ben Frank Wilson. Mary Emily was born about 1845 and died about 1912. They were the parents of at least two children: John Laban Asbury Wilson and Nannie, who married R. P. Hopkins.

John R. Cray married for his second wife, Lennie Fisher Letton, the widow of Burton Letton. John R. Cray is buried in the Letton Graveyard, Bourbon County.

2. Andrew Cray, who married his cousin, Emily Ann Robbins, in Bourbon County, Sept. 8, 1831. It is believed that Andrew Cray died while serving as a Confederate soldier in the Civil War. Emily Ann Robbins was born

March 13, 1814, and died June 4, 1897. She is buried in the Elizaville Cemetery, Fleming County.

Andrew and Emily Ann Cray were the parents of at least one son, Dr. William Collins Cray, who was born July 4, 1836, and died Dec. 13, 1899, in Fleming County. He married Sarah Jane Martin, daughter of Jeremiah John Martin and Nancy (McCormick) Martin, of Nicholas County, Kentucky; and one daughter, Annie Cray, who married T. J. Rye.

Emily Ann Robbins Cray married secondly Isaac H. Skillman, of Bourbon County. Mr. Skillman had previously married a sister of Emily Ann Robbins.

3. Martin Asburry Cray, born about 1822, in Kentucky, married Mary J. (Molly) Spencer, June 16, 1857 in Nicholas County. They had one son, James Cray, who married Maggie Current in Bourbon County, Feb. 26, 1890. They were parents of two daughters, Myrtle and Mary Louise.
4. Katherine Pamela Cray, who was born near Millersburg, Ky. (when?) and married her cousin, Caleb Wesley Robbins, who was born in 1829 and died in 1891.

If there were other children, it is not known. Harrison A. Cray, age 14, was living in the household of Martin L. and Mary Cray in the 1850 census, but it is likely that he was a grandson.

The Cray and Robbins families were closely tied by marriage. Mary, wife of Martin L. Cray, was a sister of Maj. John Robbins, of Little Rock, Bourbon County, Kentucky, and Spencer Robbins, who settled first in Nicholas County, Kentucky, but later in life moved to Bath or Morgan County, Kentucky. Three of Mary Robbins Cray's children married three children of her brother, Major John Robbins.

The Medical Registry, in the Fleming County Clerk's Office, states that William C. Cray applied for a license to practice medicine in Fleming County, November 22, 1888. He gave his age as 51 past. He states that he

began his practice of medicine at Flat Rock, Bourbon County, in June 1859, and continued until November, 1861. He next practiced in Nicholas County from September 1863 to June 20, 1888, when he moved to Fleming County. He gave his birthplace as Nicholas County.

(Note: It is known that he was a soldier in the Confederate Army during the years 1861-63 and was captured and imprisoned at Camp Morton, Indiana. Dr. Cray was a graduate of the Cincinnati Eclectic Medical College, Cincinnati, Ohio.)

In Nicholas County, there are some members of the Cray family in the court records not identified with this family. One of these is:

Edward Cray who married Salley L. Townsend, in Nicholas County, July 14, 1818.

The only other record of this Edward Cray is found in Deed Book G, page 240, Nicholas County, January 13, 1826, Edward Cray mortgages to Spencer Robbins, of Nicholas County, certain personal property.

It is probable that this Edward Cray was a brother of Martin L. Cray.

The next unidentified member of this family is Elijah Collins Cray, who is mentioned in two Nicholas County deeds, first as Collins Cray and second as Elijah Collins Cray.

Deed Book L, page 473, Nicholas County:

Israel H. Piper and wife, Permelia Jane, of Bourbon County, sell to John R. and Collins Cray, of Nicholas County, land on McBride's Creek, Nicholas Co., containing 48 acres, Aug. 21, 1838.

Deed Book M, page 291, Nicholas County:

John R. Cray and Elijah Collins Cray, of Nicholas Co., sell to John Henry Smith, of Nicholas, a tract in Nicholas County.

It is likely that Elijah Collins Cray was a brother of John R. Cray, thus a son of Martin L. and Mary (Robbins) Cray.

The last puzzle in this family involves Andrew H. and Andrew W. Cray. One of the sons of Martin L. and Mary (Robbins) Cray was Andrew Cray, who married Emily Ann Robbins. There are two deeds in Nicholas County for Andrew H. Cray:

Deed Book L, page 310, Nicholas Co.: July 15, 1837
Andrew H. Cray mortgages to Martin L. Cray, certain personal property.

Deed Book L, page 311, Nicholas Co.: Andrew H. Cray, of Nicholas Co., to John R. Cray, his interest in 48 acres purchased from Israel H. Piper last winter and other personal property, as security for a certain debt.

It is thought that this Andrew H. Cray is the husband of Emily Ann Robbins and a son of Martin L. and Mary (Robbins) Cray. Family tradition says he was killed in the Civil War and an old photograph of Andrew Cray indicates that he was far away from home in the war, by a note written on it.

However, in the records of the Adjutant General of Kentucky, at Frankfort, there is a record of an Andrew W. Cray, who was killed in the Civil War. The record states that Andrew W. Cray was a private in Company H, 4th Regt. Infantry, Ky. Volunteers, Confederate States Army, enlisted at Camp Burnett, Aug. 9, 1861, and died near Bowling Green, Warren County, Kentucky, Oct. 2, 1861.

Perhaps the middle initial on the service record is incorrect.

It is known that the family came to Bourbon and Nicholas from Maryland, but no connection has been made with the Crays of Maryland. The 1790 census of Maryland lists James Cray, of Talbot County; and two different John Crays of Baltimore.

ACTS PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH
GENERAL ASSEMBLY FOR THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY
BEGUN AND HELD IN THE TOWN OF FRANKFORT, ON MONDAY THE
SEVENTH DAY OF DECEMBER, IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE
THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE....

Page 163 - CHAP. CCCXVI - An Act for the benefit of
Polly Flowers

Approved, January 28, 1830. Whereas, it is represented to the present General Assembly, that a certain Polly Flowers of Edmondson county, was once legally married to William Lindsey of the said county; that said Lindsey treated her badly, in consequence of which they lived separate and apart; that whilst they so lived, the said Lindsey, by falsely representing to her, that a divorce obtained by him would operate as a divorce to both, induced her to consent that a decree should be rendered in his favor, for a divorce, which was done. And whereas, it also appears that the said Polly has since intermarried with a certain James Flowers, by whom she had one child, and by whom she is treated with great kindness and affection; and that the said Polly has been presented by the Edmonson circuit court, for living in adultery with her present husband, and that she is liable to the penalties of the law: and whereas, it appears that the said Polly and James Flowers are solicitous to be relieved therefrom: Therefore,

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, That the said Polly Flowers, alias Polly Lindsey, be, and she is hereby released from all the pains and penalties prescribed by law against a person marrying the second time, the first husband or wife still living.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, that if the said James and Polly Flowers shall, after the passage of this Act, see proper to intermarry, then such marriage shall be taken to relate back to the time of their aforesaid illegal marriage, for all and every purpose in law whatever.

Page 37. CHAP. CCCXXXI - An Act for the benefit of Ann
Eliza Nelson -

Approved, January 8, 1831 ... that David P. Nelson, has
by a decree of the Nelson circuit court, obtained a
divorce from his wife Ann Eliza Nelson, on the ground
only; and whereas, the said Ann Eliza Nelson has pre-
sented a petition to the General Assembly, praying that
she shall be restored to the rights and privileges of
a single woman, which is considered reasonable: where-
fore,

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of
the Commonwealth of Kentucky, that the said Ann Eliza
Nelson, be, and she is hereby invested with all the
rights and privileges of a single woman.

Page 53 CHAP. CCCXLII - An Act to divorce Elizabeth
Fannan from her husband Joseph Fannan -

Approved, January 8, 1831 ... That the marriage between
Joseph Fannan and Elizabeth Fannan be, and the same is
hereby dissolved; and the said Elizabeth is hereby re-
stored to all the rights and privileges of an unmarried
woman.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY FOR THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY,

Page 16 CHAP. DLXXXIII - An Act to change the name of
Elizabeth Boyd to that of Elizabeth Foreman.

Approved November 15, 1831. Whereas Elizabeth Boyd, at
the August term eighteen hundred and thirty-one of the
Spencer circuit court, obtained a divorce from her
husband John Boyd; and she is desirous to resume her
maiden name of Elizabeth Foreman, and to authorize her
to do so:

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of
the Commonwealth of Kentucky, That the name of Elizabeth
Boyd is hereby changed to that of Elizabeth Foreman.

Page 20 - CHAP. DLXXXIX - An Act for the benefit of
John W. Brite

Approved, November 18, 1831 ... That the marriage contract between John W. Brite and his wife Fanny Brite, so far as the said John is bound thereby, be, and the same is hereby dissolved; and the said John W. Brite shall hereafter in all things be considered an unmarried man.

Page 31 - CHAP. DCVIII - An Act for the benefit of
Reuben Drysdale and others

Approved November 26, 1831 ... That by a decree of the Jessamine circuit court, Mary Drysdale, formerly the wife of Reuben Drysdale, has obtained a divorce from her said husband, and that said Mary has married another man: Therefore,

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, that said Reuben Drysdale be, and he is hereby restored to all the rights and privileges of an unmarried man: and,

Whereas Edy Marcum, the wife of William Marcum, has obtained a divorce from her said husband, in the Lawrence circuit court, and has since married another man: Therefore,

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That the said William Marcum be restored to all the rights and privileges of an unmarried man: and

Whereas Kitty Fergerson, the wife of James Fergerson, has obtained a divorce from her said husband, by a decree of the Fayette circuit court; and the wife of Presly (sic) N. O'Bannon hath obtained a divorce from said Presley, by a decree of the Logan circuit court: Wherefore,

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, that the said James Fergerson and Presley N. O'Bannon be restored to all the rights and privileges of unmarried men.

Page 103 - CHAP. DCLXX - An Act to divorce Harriette H.
Rudd.

Approved, December 13, 1831 ... That Harriett H. Rudd be, and is hereby divorced from her husband John H. Rudd; and she shall be, hereafter, taken and considered

to be an unmarried woman, and enjoy all the rights and privileges thereof.

Page 104 - CHAP. DCLXXII - An act to divorce Mary Jane Caldwell -

Approved December 13, 1831. ... That Mary Jane Caldwell is hereby divorced from Thomas L. Caldwell, and restored to all the rights and privileges of an unmarried woman.

Page 124. - CHAP. DCXCI - An Act for the divorce of Polly Clemmons, from her husband Benjamin Clemmons.

Approved, December 22, 1831. ... That the marriage contract heretofore existing between Polly Clemmons, and Benjamin Clemmons her husband, as to the said Polly be, and the same is hereby annulled and set aside; and the said Polly Clemmons be, and she is hereby restored to all the privileges and immunities of a feme sole.

Page 182 - CHAP. DCCXXIX - An Act to divorce George Ross -

Approved, December 23, 1831. ... Whereas, Joanna Ross obtained a divorce from her husband George Ross, in the Boone circuit court: Therefore,

... That the said George Ross is hereby restored to all the rights and privileges of an unmarried man.

Page 243 - CHAP. DCCLXXII - An Act for the benefit of Mary Ann Flournoy -

She was born June 29, 1797 on the plantation where she died which was selected by her father in 1776. Shortly after her birth she was christened by one of the first Catholic priests visiting the state. She was married three times, first to Mr. Forsythe, second to Vachael Masterson. By this marriage one daughter, Mrs. Martha Best, survives. In 1835 she was married to Nimrod Robison by whom she had two children, Silas and Rufus Robinson, who survive. She joined the Baptist church 60 years ago and was immersed by Elder Jesse Holton, Sr. The funeral took place this morning."

Ignatius Mitchell - Revolutionary Soldier - "Maryland Archives" Volume XVIII, page 137 - "Maryland Troops," Volume 1 - for service.

The second town established by Act of Virginia Legislature in Mason county in 1787 was Charles Town on 80 acres of land which had been granted to Ignatius Mitchell Feb. 8, 1780.

Dr. John Todd was born 13 October 1783, the son of General Robert Todd and Ann Todd, of Fayette County, Kentucky. He died 29 April 1860 in Daviess County, Kentucky, and is buried at Elmwood Cemetery, Owensboro, with two of his sons - Drs. Thomas and David F. Todd.

He had resided at Danville, Kentucky, and in Fayette and Daviess counties, Kentucky. On 10 April 1807 in Fayette County Dr. John Todd was married to his cousin, Nancy Todd, born 21 September 1784 and died 28 July 1846. She was the daughter of General Levi Todd (1756-1807) and his first wife, Jane (Jean) Logan Briggs, and the paternal aunt of Mrs. Mary Todd Lincoln, wife of President Abraham Lincoln.
