Harlan Hubbard, 88

Wildlife and landscape artist Harlan Hubbard, who lived a simple life in a remote Kentucky hollow creating paintings, drawings and woodcuts which are considered among the finest ever made in the Ohio Valley, has died at age 88.

He died Saturday, Jan. 16, at a friend's home in Madison, Ind., after a long illness.

The Bellevue native was also the author of three books, "Shantyboat," "Payne Hollow" and "Journals; 1929-1944."

"Payne Hollow" refers to the location of the home he shared for 37 years with his late wife, Anna. The handcrafted cabin, on the Trimble County riverbank about nine miles southwest of Madison, had no electricity or modern conveniences.

"Shantyboat" was based on the Hubbards' five-year voyage down the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. The couple cast off from Fort Thomas in 1947 and on a 10-by-16 foot motorless shantyboat, searching for a place where they could live independently and in harmony with nature.

They discovered Payne Hollow, and in 1952, at the conclusion of their voyage, they returned there to build their home.

Hubbard's artwork and unusual way of life attracted visitors from across the country. Because no road led to his home, visitors either trekked down a long, steep path to his home from the ridge above, or rang a large bell across the river, near Hanover, Ind., to summon Hubbard, who would fetch his visitors in a johnboat.

The couple lived "fully and happily," in their words, without plumbing, television, radio, telephones or newspapers.

They grew most of their food in a

garden they tilled by hand, then preserved their bounty---berries, vegetables and fruit---for the winter.

The couple's favorite possession was their Steinway grand piano. Both were pianists and violinists and often played quartets with their visitors.

Anna Hubbard died in May 1986. That year Hubbard received the first Kentucky governor's award for lifetime achievement as an artist.

A permanent exhibit of 14 of Hubbard's paintings, depicting life along the Ohio River, was established at Hanover College in February 1986.

Hubbard had no survivors.

A memorial service will be held Feb. 6 at Lookout Point on the Hanover College campus.

Former Trimble residents slain

The bodies of two former Trimble County residents were found at their Larue County home Sept. 28, but Kentucky State Police have made no arrests in the case as of today.

Marvin Tingle, 53, and his mother, Victoria, 80, were found dead at their rural residence after apparently being beaten to death, reports said.

Tingle once lived at the intersection of Carlisle Road and U.S. Highway 421. He attended Trimble County High School and graduated in 1953.

Tingle's body was found in the yard while Mrs. Tingle was found in the kitchen. The bodies were located by a couple who had reportedly come to the home to buy a farm animal.

Kentucky State Police said robbery might be a motive in

One account of the deaths said it was believed the deaths were connected with moon-shining. The same account said Mrs. Tingle was hospitalized earlier in the year as an apparent result of a beating.

Last week's rains will not have serious results, said Larry Snipes, assistant statistician for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Kentucky Crop Livestock Reporting Service in Louisville.

The boggy soils and the rain haven't caused any damage, they (the farmers) want to get their work done," Snipes said Wednesday.

"If we have dry weather," he said, "by the latter part of this I imagine some of them will be harvesting again." They still have plenty of time, I think," Snipes said. While most of the state had favorable harvesting weather last week, rains dampened

western grain and wet weather made it difficult to use heavy harvesting machinery on many large western Kentucky farms.

"It's mainly the corn that they are trying to get harvested now," Snipes said.

Reclamation Bureau

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — The bureau has been created in the state Department for Natural Resources and Environment Protection to enable Kentucky to cope with requirements of new federal strip mine law.

Gov. Julian Carroll signed the executive order last week establishing the Bureau of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement. The bureau replaces the Division of Reclamation.

"Creation of the new bureau is the first step in efforts by the state and the department to qualify Kentucky for prime (enforcement) responsibility under the act," Carroll said.

Woman is victim in Carroll mishap

A 32-year-old Carroll County woman was killed when the pickup truck she was driving collided with a tree near Prestonville early this morning.

According to Kentucky State Police Trooper David Stevenson, Bobbi Stephens, 610 Taylor St., Carrollton, was pronounced dead on arrival at Carroll County Memorial Hospital at 3:43 a.m. today.

A passenger in the pickup truck, Roy Wells, 34, Box 121 Sparta, sustained moderate to serious injuries in the crash and was admitted to the hospital in Carrollton.

Stevenson, an accident reconstructionist from the LaGrange post who investigated the crash, said Stephens died of "multiple head and chest injuries" sustained when she was thrown from the vehicle.

Stephens was traveling eastbound on U.S. 42 at about 2:55 a.m. when the accident occurred. The trooper noted the woman's 1989 Chevrolet S-10 pickup truck left the south side of the roadway for "undetermined

reasons" and collided with two trees.

Stephens, who was not wearing a seat belt, was thrown from the driver's side window of the truck on impact. The officer said a preliminary investigation has identified alcohol as a contributing factor in the crash, but no charges have been filed.

Stevenson was assisted at the scene by members of the Westside Volunteer Fire Department, the Carroll County Ambulance Service, the Carroll County Rescue Squad and officers Greg Ford and David Willhoite of the Carrollton Police Department.

The accident, which occurred near the Westside Volunteer Fire Department, was the fourth traffic fatality in Carroll County this year.

The other three fatalities all came in a four-vehicle accident on Ky. 36 — a location about two miles from this morning's accident scene.

Although this morning's crash was officially listed as occurring
